"This is our community celebration to raise funds for cancer research." said Betty Louden. St. Francis, one of the coordinators.

There are several ways the Relay earns money for research. Last year was the first year for accepting and auctioning baskets. The baskets contained everything from sports items (some including tickets to games), baskets filled with treats, household items or children items. They sold from \$25 to \$100 each.

"Last year, the Relay raised \$26,000 and we were the first in the state for raising the most money per capita," Mrs. Louden said. "This
