ORDINANCE NO. 543

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING PUBLIC OFFENSES WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS; INCORPORATING BY REFERENCE THE "UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE FOR KANSAS CITIES," EDITION OF 2007, AMENDING SECTION 101 OF ARTICLE 11 OF THE 2003 CODE OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 538.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS, that Ordinance No. 538 be repealed and that Section 101 of Article 11 of the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas and entitled "INCORPORATING UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE" is hereby amended to read as follows:

FORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of St. Francis, Kansas, that certain code known as the "Uniform Public Offense Code," Edition of 2007, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, no fewer than three copies of said Uniform Public Offense Code shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 543," and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours.

This amendment to the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas shall be effective upon its publication in the **St. Francis Herald**.

ORDINANCE NO. 544

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS; INCORPORATING BY REFERENCE THE "STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE FOR KANSAS CITIES," EDITION OF 2007, AMENDING SECTION 101 OF ARTICLE 14 OF THE 2003 CODE OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 539.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS, that Ordinance No. 539 be repealed and that Section 101 of Article 14 of the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas, and entitled "INCORPORATING STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE" is hereby amended to read as follows:

fic ordinance known as the "Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities," Edition of 2007, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas. No fewer than three copies of said Standard Traffic Ordinance shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 544," and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours. The police department, municipal judge and all administrative departments of the city charged with enforcement of the ordinance shall be supplied, at the cost of the city, such number of official copies of such Standard Traffic Ordinance similarly marked, as may be deemed expedient.

This amendment to the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas shall be effective upon its publication in the **St. Francis Herald**.
