It was also noted that, if something were to disappear, the board would be held accountable and that was another reason for only board members to have keys. The commissioners upheld the Historical Society's board ruling on keys and suggested that they continue with their present policy of limited keys — that is why the organization has board members.

Mr. Carman said the church, which is located by the museum on U.S. 36, St. Francis, was "going downhill."

The siding on the church will not hold paint, the church windows and the sills need replaced, the front doors have cracks and the steeple roof leaks.

A bid for painting the church and been received but, it didn't include painting the steeple. It would just be a matter of a few years and the church would need painted again.

"We need some money to help restore it," he said, estimating that the cost could be between \$40,000 and

The commissioners suggested that the Kansas Historical Society be contacted to see if the building would qualify for a grant. However, the members were concerned that previous improvements, such as replacing the oldshingledroom with a tinroof, would keep them from qualifying. Andy Beikman, commissioner, saidthatit was worth a try and they might even help in restoring it back to its original condition including replacing the roof.

The county gives an appropriation of \$4,780 to the Historical Society. The insurance, utilities and other miscellaneous expenses come out of this amount. People have given donations and a small amount of money comes from researching genealogy information, the sale of books and DVDs compiled by the Society members.

Others representing the Society at the meeting were Janet Carman, Deb Harper, Rachel Huffman and Lucille Rossbach.
