A new school year has started. Most of the same vorite CD or DVD. teachers and staff will be there to greet students as they come through the classroom doors. However, there will be a change in the superintendent's

Carl Werner, after 30 years, as superintendent, has stepped down and Rob Schiltz is there in his

Mr. Werner just "slipped out" of the office with no bells and whistles, no tributes or going-away parties. That was how he wanted it and that was how he ran the school all those years — in a quiet way, making sure the students had the best education possible by providing them a safe, wellkept facility and good teachers.

Often called "Chief" by students and staff, he was the solid, quiet figure who cared about them like they were his family. He was sad when the school year ended and happy when it started back

He helped plan the track and the new wrestling room at the high school but, at the same time, made sure there were adequate funds to run the school. In his last years as superintendent, he would have liked to seen a second gym added to the high school. This gym would have replaced the gym in the grade school where B-team games were played, and, if large enough, would have given St. Francis the opportunity to hold some regional wrestling and sub-state basketball tournament.

He guided the board when they began purchasing the last activity bus for the school. It is a nice, safe bus. There were people who criticized the cost be sports, music or other events, in comfort. It even has a monitor where students can watch their fa-

Mr. Werner, through the years, had learned a lot about activity buses. He would grin everytime he referred to the "Pickle," which was a big bus they painted "Indian green." Everyone knew St. Francis kids were there just by seeing the green bus in the parking area.

Mr. Werner had some difficult decisions to make. One of them was when the school's enrollment had dropped to where it was no longer financially feasible to have two teachers for each of the elementary grades. Those teachers who had taught long enough to take their benefits were asked to retire and they were then rehired as part-time. Mr. Werner also took this same route and retired, only to be rehired as part-time. There were many years when he did not take a pay increase, but made sure that the teachers had at least a cost-of-living raise.

When Mr. Werner was getting ready to retire, the board hired Mr. Schiltz to train under him. Because this was going to be an additional expense to the school, Mr. Werner, who was already on very limited pay, volunteered to work for practically nothing so Mr. Schiltz could easily step into the job. Mr. Schiltz, after he took over, said that he could not imagine what it would have been like if Mr. Werner had not helped him.

Now that school has started, Mr. Werner may not be in the superintendent's office but, when a contract was broken several weeks ago, there was a vacancy in the teaching staff and he stepped up to the plate. Until there is a replacement, he will help supervise the weight-lifting classes. but the kids can now travel to activites, whether it Again, always with the good of the students and the school in mind.
