# **Co-op receives rural business grant**

Rawlins County Square Deal The newly formed High Plains Food Co-op, a loosely knit group of livestock producers, consumers and farmers, recently received good news that boosts their efforts to have an up-and-running web-based cooperative by next spring.

The cooperative was awarded a \$40,000 rural business enterprise grant from the United States Department of Agriculture Rural Development program. Plus, the Rocky Mountain Farmers Union, the co-op's sponsoring organization, will donate \$23,000 in matching funds.

"We are hoping this grant can be a catalyst to help the co-op get off the ground," said Bob Mailander,
