Wages for the county were compared with similar jobs in the city, state and other counties when the Cheyenne County Commissioners met on Wednesday, Aug. 15. They found that the county's employees were the lowest paid so, next year, instead of a 3-percent increase, they will receive a 5-percent in their pay-


Meet the teachers
