Wanting to move closer to home, he took a position in the Post Rock District (Beloit), then went to Thomas County and this last year, was in Logan County working as an Extension agent.

"I want to make a positive difference in the county," he said. "I love working with kids and promoting 4-Н."

Mr. Leibbrandt will also be available in other areas helping in the District as the livestock agent. He will be working with producers on grazing management practices, various health concerns they may

have in cattle and marketing of cattle. He said there is increasing interest in grass-fed beef and "niche" marketing.

'There are opportunities for the small producers to be successful if they know where to look," he said, noting that is another area in which he will be working with ranchers.

He said with today's aging farmers, some may want to look at leasing their herd. This is a way that a farmer can help a younger rancher get started while still providing the older farmer with income.

He would like to see the 4-H program continue to grow. He noted Tye Faulkender, former director, had done an excellent job and it was a good situation to step into.

"I want the program to do well and help the kids see success," he said. "Giving young people the opportunity to succeed is important and 4-H can help them though public speaking and leadership.

The Homecoming Dance will be held from 8:30 to 11:30 p.m. on Saturday, ending a long week of activities and excitement.


