Youth attend show

Kyla Bandel, Mariah Beikman, Martin Beikman, Lakyn Pettijohn and Dallas Reed all of St. Francis, were among the youth livestock exhibitors who have entered 1,616 animals in the Kansas Junior Livestock Show. This is the largest number of livestock entered in 20 years.

A total of 767 exhibitors will show 146 steers, 310 heifers, 468 hogs, 304 lambs, 39 ewes, 198 wether dams and 151 meat goats. The competition will take place Sept. 21 to Sept. 24 at the Kansas Coliseum near Wichita.

The top five steers, hogs and lambs, and the top two goats, will sell during the Kansas Junior Livestock Show Auction of Champion on Sept. 24. Exhibitors of the winning animals typically use money earned from the auction to help fund their college education and purchase next year's livestock project.

Show organizers will present a minimum of \$12,000 in scholarships to exhibitors who have excelled academically, in community service and in 4-H/FFA.

"The responsibility of preparing for and showing at this event provides a great learning experience for Kansas youth," said Kansas Junior Livestock Show president Todd Johnson, Topeka.

In conjunction with the livestock shows, a showmanship contest will be held. Champion showmen in the contest, sponsored by the Kansas Junior Livestock Association, will receive silver belt


