Highway business re-opens

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Bud and Lounie Erskin, owner of Majestic Service Station, has relocated the business back to where it originally was on west U.S. 36, St.

Mr. Erskin bought the Majestic on July 1, 1986, where he ran a gas station and repaired cars, trucks and semi trucks. But, in 1995, he was offered a deal that he said he couldn't refuse and took it!

He moved the station to River Street where he continued to do mechanic work, sold tires and also took on the U-Haul dealership.

The people who purchased the U.S. 36 building did some remodeling and took out the old buried gas tanks but eventually went out of business. Recently, the property went up for sale and, in June, Mr. Erskin purchased it again.

He has replaced windows, put in new dropped ceilings and cleaned up the front where he plans to put in more tires.

a convenience store. He has painted the roof and put a new awning in the front. Eventually, the "Majestic" sign will go back up.

He has already moved his tools and equipment to the mechanic shop in the back and he is repairing cars, trucks and semi trucks, replacing and selling tires, doing service and engine work. His equipment is set up and he will be able to work on electronic equipment as well as air conditioners.

"If it has four wheels, I can fix it! If it has two wheels, I can fix it! If it has no wheels, I can fix it!" he said. He says he will also repair lawnmowers and other small machinery but notes that he is looking for more mechanics.

When the gas pumps are installed, Mr. Erskin said there will be a fullfamily service island where people can get their gas pumped and windows washed. He said he will also be expanding his tire sales by carrying
