"The preamble to the Constitution and Bylaws expressed the goals of the organization. 'In pursuit of happiness, it is necessary to develop the best within ourselves, then reach out and help others. Therefore we, the women of Haigler and vicinity for our mutual improvement do

form ourselves into an organization by the name of the Haigler Woman's Club.'

"Banquets and plays were often held in the early years. Many of the enjoyable and appreciated events of the Haigler Community are results of the Woman's Club in cooperation with other organizations. The swings and the first walks at the school, sponsoring of Girl Scouts,

maintained by club members along with the whisky barrel flower planters. A flower garden, in the cemetery, has been maintained by club members since 1974. It is hoped that these activities can continue to be performed. Membership has dwindled due to health, death and disinterest.

"Recently, when it got to the point of four ladies in attendance (two others paid dues) it was decided to disband. The money in the treasury was given to local needs."

The community of Haigler owes a debt of gratitude to those ladies. Is it possible that some of the residents could have rallied to their support had more of the people been aware of the situation?

ORDINANCE NO. 548

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 544, WHICH ADOPTED BY REFERENCE THE "STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE FOR KANSAS CITIES, EDITION 2007" BY DELETING SECTIONS 114.1 AND 114.2 AND AUTHORIZING, UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS, THE OPERATION OF WORK-SITE UTILITY VEHICLES AND ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES ON CERTAIN STREETS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS; PROVIDING FOR RELATED MATTERS INCLUDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

traffic infraction. Upon an entry of a plea of guilty or no contest or upon being convicted of such violation, the penalty imposed shall be in accordance with Section 201, 2007 Standard Traffic Ordinance, and amendments thereto, or such other similar provision as the city may then have in effect.

(g) Work-site utility vehicles and all-terrain vehicles shall not exceed 20 mph.

(h) All work-site utility vehicles and all-terrain vehicles shall be equipped, maintained and operated so as to prevent excessive or unusual noise.

(i) No all-terrain vehicles are allowed on U.S. Highway 36, the Access Road or to travel Washington Street in either an easterly or westerly direction.

(j) All laws, ordinances and other rules of the road that are applicable to the operator or occupant of a motor vehicle within the city limits are also applicable to operators and riders of work-site utility vehicles and all-terrain vehicles.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS, that sections 114.1 and 114.2 of the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities as adopted by reference pursuant to Ordinance 544 be deleted and the following be adopted:

Section 1. OPERATION OF WORK-SITE UTILITY VEHICLES AND ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES; PENALTY.

(a) Work-site utility vehicles and all-terrain vehicles may be operated upon the public highways, streets, roads, and alleys within the corporate limits of the city between sunrise and 10 p.m.

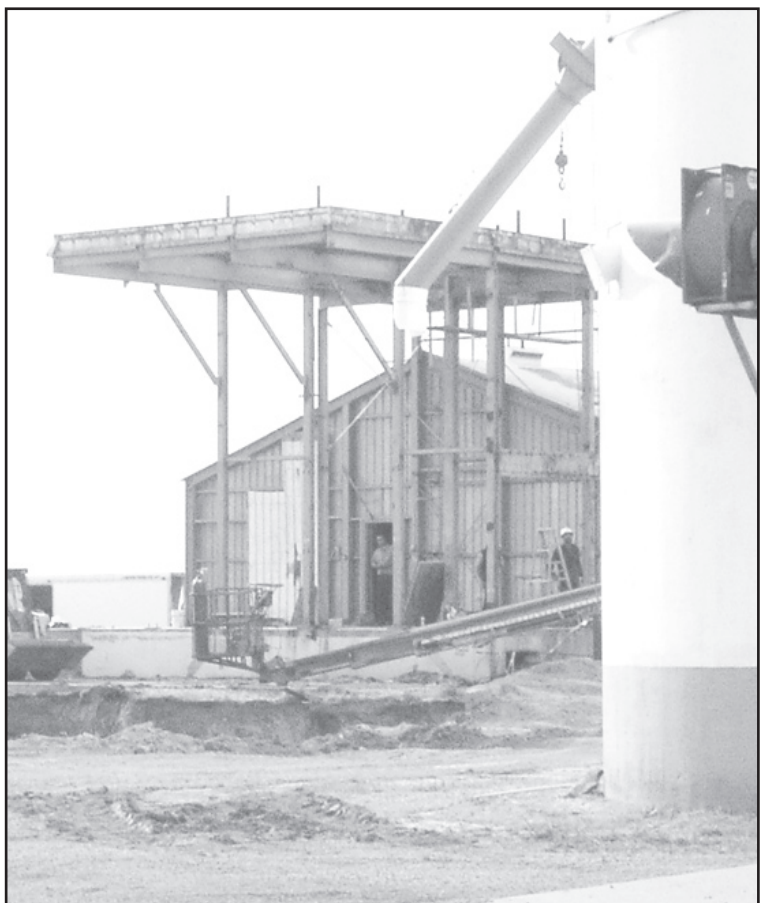
(b) No work-site utility vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street, road, or alley unless such vehicle shall comply with the equipment requirements under the provisions of article 17, chapter 8 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated.

(c) No all-terrain vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street, road, or alley after sunset, unless equipped with lights as required for motorcycles.

(d) No person shall operate a work-site utility vehicle and all-terrain vehicles on any public highway, street, road or alley within the corporate limits of the city unless such person has a valid driver's license.

(e) No person under the age of 18 years shall operate or ride upon a work-site utility vehicle or an all-terrain vehicle unless wearing a helmet which complies with minimum guidelines established by the national highway traffic safety administration pursuant to the national traffic and motor vehicle safety act of 1966 for helmets designed for use by motorcyclists and other motor vehicle users, along with applicable eye protection.

(f) A violation of this section shall be deemed an ordinance

The sun sets back in time 44 years ago when the feed mill was built to serve the community and those who were farming and needed grain for their livestock needs.

The Idalia feed mill and coop elevators and station were built in 1963 as part of St. Francis Equity Coop. Larry Beckman and Edward Pfeiler were two of the first employees. Clifford Like was manager for many years.

The past two weeks, the feed mill facility has been dismantled and will be relocated to Mitchell, S.D.

Rosedale Farms will put the facility to good use. Rosedale farms 9,500 acres, feeds 40,000 turkeys and is a large swine operation.
