FRANCIS, KANSAS; PROVIDING FOR RELATED MAT-TERS INCLUDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

BEITORDAINED BYTHE CITYOF (j) All laws, ordinances and other ST FRANCIS KANSAS that sections 114.1 and 114.2 of the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities as adopted by reference pursuant to Ordinance 544 be deleted and the following be adopted:

traffic infraction. Upon an entry of a plea of guilty or no contest or upon being convicted of such violation, the penalty imposed shall be in accordance with Section 201, 2007 Standard Traffic Ordinance, and amendments thereto, or such other similar provision as

the city may then have in effect. (g) Work-site utility vehicles and all-terrain vehicles shall not exceed 20 mph.

(h) All work-site utility vehicles and all-terrain vehicles shall be equipped, maintained and operated so as to prevent excessive or unusual noise.

(i) No all-terrain vehicles are allowed on U.S. Highway 36, the Access Road or to travel Washington Street in either an easterly or westerly direction.

Section 1. OPERATION OF WORK-SITE UTILITY VEHICLES AND ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES; PENALTY.

(a) Work-site utility vehicles and all-terrain vehicles may be operated upon the public highways, streets, roads, and allevs within the corporate limits of the city between sunrise and 10 p.m.

(b) No work-site utility vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street, road, or alley unless such vehicle shall comply with the equipment requirements under the provisions of article 17, chapter 8 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated

(c) No all-terrain vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street, road, or alley after sunset, unless equipped with lights as required for motorcycles.

(d) No person shall operate a work-site utility vehicle and all-terrain vehicles on any public highway, street, road or alley within the corporate limits of the city unless such person has a valid driver's license.

(e) No person under the age of 18 years shall operate or ride upon a work-site utility vehicle or an all-terrain vehicle unless wearing a helmet which complies with minimum guidelines established by the national highway traffic safety administration pursuant to the national traffic and motor vehicle safety act of 1966 for helmets designed for use by motorcyclists and other motor vehicle users, along with applicable eye protection.

(f) A violation of this section shall be deemed an ordinance



to the operator or occupant of a motor vehicle within the city limits are also applicable to operators and riders of work-site utility vehicles and all-terrain vehicles.

Section 2. SAME; DEFINITIONS.

(a) "Work-site utility vehicle" means any motor vehicle which is not less than 48 inches in width, has an overall length, including the bumper, of not more than 135 inches, has an unladen weight, including fuel and fluids, of more than 800 pounds and is equipped with four or more low pressure tires, a steering wheel, and bench or bucket type seating allowing at least two people to sit side-by-side, and may be equipped with a bed or cargo box for hauling materials.

(b) "All-terrain vehicle" means any motorized non-highway vehicle 48 inches or less in width, having a dry weight of 1,000 pounds or less, traveling on three or more low pressure tires, and having a seat to be straddled by the operator. As used in this subsection, "low pressure tire" means any pneumatic tire six inches or more in width, designed for use on wheels with rim diameter of 12 inches or less, and utilizing an operating pressure of 10 pounds per square inch or less as recommended by the vehicle manufacturer.
