Environmental Quality Incentives Program—one of the largest programs in the 2002 Farm Bill—is a voluntary conservation program that promotes environmental quality and assists producers to meet local, state, and federal regulations.

'Environmental Quality Incentives Program is available to help limited resource and beginning farmers and ranchers, who have unique circumstances and natural resource concerns that need to be addressed on their land.

In Kansas, the program may offer limited resource and beginning farmers and ranchers a higher payment rate for structural and vegetative practices," Mrs. Gienger said.

"The incentive payments have been popular with our current participants. They provide a financial buffer while the producer is learning a new management method.'
