Indians defeat **Buffs**

The Indians overcame early fumbles Thursday night to defeat the Rawlins County Buffaloes 50-12. This was the final regular-season game of the year with the Indians moving into post-season play on Tuesday night (Oct. 30) against the Hoxie

"We're excited about being in the playoffs," Coach Tim Lambert said. "It was good to win our District.


"Things will be getting exciting now." Both St. Francis and Rawlins County qualified for Bi-District action with the Indians finishing number one in District 14 and the Buffs number two. The other two teams in District 14 are Syracuse and Wichita County. The Buffs' Tuesday night opponent was the Oakley Plainsmen. Only the winners advance in post-season play.

St. Francis went into Bi-District play with an 8-1 record. Their only loss being to Oakley on Sept. 21 in Oakley.

The winner of the St. Francis/Hoxie game will play the winner of the Meade/ Sublette game on Saturday in Regional competition.

Thirty-two 2A teams went into postseason play on Tuesday by placing either first or second in their District. After Tuesday night the field was down to 16 teams. Only the eight winning Regional teams will continue on to Sectional games. The teams narrow down to four for Sub-State and two
