Board approves contracts

karenk@nwkansas.com The St. Francis Board of Education approved the signing of contracts and contract amendments when they met on Tuesday, Nov. 13.

Superintendent Rob Schiltz said former employee Johnnie Miller, grade school custodian, informed him verbally on Oct. 15, that he had taken a different job and needed to start the job the following Monday. He said there had been no letter of resignation, even though it had been requested. The board agreed to accept the apparent resignation of Mr. Miller.

They signed the contract for Daryl Loyd as the assistant high school wrestling coach. The board approved amending the contract of Devin Dinkel to include being the assistant high school boys' basketball coach, filling the position vacated by Brett Petersen.

The other contract amendment was for Lucinda Straub, changing her contract from a 9-month custodian position to a 12-month head custodian position at the elementary school. This position was previously held by Mr. Miller. Sherry Weeks, board member, abstained from voting.

Excellence award

Mr. Schiltz said the Kansas Assessment Standard of Excellence award had been received from the Kansas State Department of Education. The awards are given to schools in individual classes within the schools which have met a rigorous rubric dealing with assessment scores.

St. Francis schools received Excellence awards at every grade level tested in reading (grades third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and 11th) and in math (grades third, sixth, cluding suspension and expulsion. If

seventh and eighth) and in writing (grades eighth and 11th). Tentative plans are to have students and teachers receiving the awards be recognized at the Dundy County basketball game.

Mr. Schiltz also shared a plaque that had been received from the Kansas State Board of Education presenting the Governor's Achievement Award for 2006-2007 to the St. Francis High School for receiving the "Building Level Standard of Excellence" in both reading and math, meeting the Adequate Yearly Progress requirements and being in the top 5 percent of high schools in the state. Only 19 of approximately 196 high schools in the state received this award.

Bullying policy

All school districts in Kansas must adopt a bullying policy on or before Jan. 1. Mr. Schiltz had reviewed several policies on bullying and he recommended adopting the policy created by the Kansas Association of School Boards.

The policy reads: The board of education prohibits bullying in any form on school property, in a school vehicle or at a school-sponsored activity or event. The administration shall propose, and the board shall review and approve a plan to address bullying on school property, in a school vehicle or at a school-sponsored activity or event.

The plan shall include provisions for the training and education of staff members and students and shall include appropriate community involvement as approved by the board. Students who have bullied others in violation of this policy may be subject to disciplinary action, up to and in-

appropriate, students who violate the bullying prohibition shall be reported to local law enforcement.

Banners

Principal Scott Carmichael told about letters that were sent to local businesses explaining details about purchasing banners that would advertise the business. These banners would be posted along the fence surrounding the football field for home events. The proceeds received from the sale of the banners will go into the Student Activity Fund to help defray the cost of officials for home events. New gym

At the October meeting, the board again had discussed the building of a new gym at the high school Mr. Schiltz had been asked to gather more information.

At the November meeting, he said he had been in contact with the State Department, with Greg Vahrenberg, managing director of Piper Jaffray, who had prepared a proposal to provide financial advisory service; and with Glen Strait, architect. The board agreed to have Mr. Schiltz contact Mr. Vahrenberg and use the company's services for proceeding with a bond election in the November 2008 presidential election.
