2008 women farm conference to be held in Hutchison

The 2008 Women Managing the Farm Conference is scheduled Feb. 8-9 at the Grand Prairie Hotel and Conference Center in Hutchinson.

Titled "Celebrating Ag Women," the conference is designed for women who are sharing agribusiness decisions with their farmer or rancher husband and for women who have either inherited - or are purchasing - a farm or acreage or choosing agriculture as a career, according to Kristy Archuleta, conference coordinator.

The women's conference concept provides educational opportunities in an environment that fosters understanding of agribusiness and opportunities to network with others who face similar challenges and decisions, Ms. Archuleta said. The conference is the fourth in a series for women in agribusiness.

This year's conference keynote topics and their speakers include:

 "Surviving Family Farming Whitewater," presented by Don Jonovic, a business consultant who frequently speaks on farm business management and guiding transitions for family farms.

• "Celebrating Ag Women," presented by Elizabeth Kinney, a KTUL television news reporter in Tulsa, Okla.

• "Relax! Your Most Important Management Skill is Self Care," presented by Charlie Griffin, an associate professor in the School of Family Studies and Human Services in the College of Human Ecology at Kansas State University. The conference also will include a resource fair and 20 concurrent workshops on topics such as planning and managing a family business meeting; evaluating insurance needs; bio-economy; creating educational opportunities for agriculture in the classroom, and food, nutrition and health tips for busy agribusiness

professionals. Early registration for the twoday conference at a reduced rate is due Feb. 1; registration after that date is additional. A partial (oneday) registration is also available. Registration includes conference sessions and materials, meals (two lunches, a dinner, and a breakfast) and refreshment breaks.

A block of rooms at a conference rate is available on a firstcome, first-served basis.

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Remember Kitchen Kid Safety

The Cheyenne County Health Department would like to take time during this holiday season to remind parents, grandparents and friends to check the kitchen for preventable hazards and to supervise children at all times in the kitchen. Whether a child is helping an adult cook or simply watching, he or she should always be attentively supervised. Burns from spills, steam, hot surface and flame care especially devastating injuries. At few basic safety hints are:

• Never leave a hot stove unattended

• Never hold a child while cooking or carrying hot items

· Cook on back burners when-

ever possible and turn all handles toward the back of the stove

• Keep hot foods and liquids away from the edges of counters and tables

• Tie up the electrical cords of small appliances

Two other kitchen hazards are injuries from sharp objects (knives) and house hold cleaner that are potential poison hazards. You know your own children. Don't give them knives or let them handle anything hot or sharp until they have shown the maturity and coordination to do it safely. Some children mature faster than others, so it's up to parents to used good judgment about each child's capabilities. Have a safe and happen holiday.

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County Health Nurse Winter is upon us and with the cold weather comes emergencies. From ice storms and downed power lines, to slippery roads and closed stores, many will struggle with the difficul-

ties that accompany snow and ice. While the weather may be unpre-

dictable, through simple preparation, people can avoid some of the difficulties that may arise. They do not need to invest a lot of time or money to have the very basic items that will help them through the most common emergencies!

Getting trapped in a car is horrible at any time of the year, but it's especially bad when it happens in the winter. Being trapped in the car in the winter can be even worse if you do not have the proper items on hand. There have been people trapped in

their car for days, but they were able to survive the cold winter days and

nights because they had the proper products in their cars. These items are meant to keep people not only warm and safe, but are also good for normal winter days.

Emergency items are:

• Jump starter. • Flash light and batteries.

- Blankets.
- First aid kit.

· Large plastic garbage bags.

• Water.

- Simple foods.
- Cell Phone with charger. · Sanitation supplies.
