Louise, the seventh child born to Robert and Inda Twiss, was born on March 15, 1931. She had the honor of being the first baby to be born in the Wray Hospital nursery after a nursery was added to the facility.

Her early childhood was spent on the M. B. Holland Ranch in the sandhills north of Wray. Here the family labored hard to earn a living for the eight children.

Louise attended the South Star school north of Wray until 1942 when the family moved to the family farm south of Platner. She and her siblings rode Shetland ponies to school and often hauled the water for the daily use in the school

She finished elementary school in the Ashland School and graduated in the old Platner gym along with three other graduates of the local country schools. Graduation for several schools was on the last day of school and was accompanied by field day activities and a community

Due to the shortage of teachers she was given the opportunity to act as a substitute teacher for her schoolmates on rare occasions. This fired her interest to become a teacher later in her life.

She graduated from the Akron High School in 1948 and entered Colorado Agriculture and Military (A&M) that fall. Following one year of college, her teaching career began and continued on for the next $26\,years.\,During\,that\,time\,she\,taught$ in country schools in Colorado and Kansas and elementary schools in Akron, Otis and Glendale, Ariz.

She finally was able to complete her college education in 1961 when she graduated from Colorado State College. Louise retired from her position as teacher/principal in the Otis Elementary School in the fall of 1978. At this time she was grateful for the opportunity to take care of her mother and become a full-time partner in the farming and ranching operations with her husband, Johnnie. She often said that she just switched her focus from kids to colts. Later on she combined these two interests by mentoring a number of interns from the equine programs at Northern Junior College and Lamar Junior College.

Louise married John W. Barnhart on Aug. 6, 1950, at her sister Kathryn's home in Englewood.

They became the proud parents of a daughter, Vicki Louise, in July of 1951. The family grew when Vicki married John Horn and added granddaughter, Kimberly and grandson, Mark. These grandchildren and their accomplishments and adventures were her most valued interest. Kimberly married Jonathan O'Neil in July of 2005. Great-granddaughter, Lina Lane O'Neil joined the family just hours after her great-grandmother died on Nov. 25, 2007.

Louise had several interests and many hobbies. She particularly enjoyed all aspects of farm and ranch life, including machinery operation, cattle raising, horse breeding and training, gardening and raising purebred Pekingese puppies. Her restful pastime involved doing beautiful embroidery work in all shapes and forms. Many of her quilts have been displayed in the lobby of the Washington County

She was a charter member of Northeastern Colorado Quarter Horse Association and a long-time member of the Buckskin Brigade. She was a member of the Methodist Church and also served the community as a hospice volunteer. She had recently joined a Bible study group which she found to be quite rewarding, both in the knowledge she gained and the new friends she

Some of her proudest moments were when she showed Soxa-Lena, the Grand Champion Paint filly, at halter at the Stock Show; when she was asked to serve as one of the grand marshals of the Washington County Fair parade; and when she and her daughter were recognized at the 2007 Alumni Banquet.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Johnnie; her parents; four sisters: Opal, Ruth, Kathryn and Doris and brothers Rex and Edward.

Then the family moved to Wheeler and the teacher refused to teach him because he wasn't 6 so he had to wait until the next year. While in Wheeler, the kids grew up playing with the other children in Wheeler, playing ball, riding ponies and getting in trouble. He finished eight years of school and then was forced to drop out of high school during the Depression.

He worked for Pearl "Ma" Quigley milking cows and delivering milk. Ma took Hurb in and, after two years working for her, he finished high school. Hurb always said, Ma Quigley kept him on the straight path by cracking her whip and teaching him work ethics.

Hurb met Lola Mae Holliman in high school and they were high school sweethearts. They were married on May 10, 1942, in the Goodland Park. They moved to Engelwood, Colo., where Hurb worked as a welder at the American Iron Works. In April 1943, they moved to Trenton, Neb., to a farm with his dad.

Hurb and Lola were blessed with three children, Charles Mickey, Donna Mae and Ronald Herbie. All three children were born at Hitchcock County Hospital in Strat-

In 1948, Hurb and his father purchased the Holliman family land which was homesteaded in 1886. Hurb worked hard and tried many things to make a living including raising sheep, Registered Shorthorn cattle, raising and racing greyhounds, along with the farming. He raced the greyhounds from 1954 to 1970. Hurb was a hard worker and was never scared to try something new. He could fix anything and was always helping the neighbors.

Hurb loved family — the more the merrier! There were always nieces and nephews living with Hurb and Lola and helping every summer. He had a way with making work fun.

In 1969, Hurb convinced Tom and Donna to come home and farm with him. Hurb and Tom increased the cattle herd and this filled Hurb's

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dream with having horses and chil-

In 1980, Hurb and Lola built a house in St. Francis and moved to town. Hurb is leaving a big hole in the community and his family.

Hurb loved to tell stories of his hunting days when he and his buddies would go coyote hunting. Hurb was active in getting Rural Electric Association (REA) Southwestern Bell power lines to the South Fork Community.

The family attended church at the South Fork Church. Hurb was a 61 year, 7 month member of the Masonic Lodge. He was a Grand Officer and still had the title of Grand Lecturer Emeritus, was a member of Order of the Eastern Star, Odd Fellows, member of the United Methodist Church and a trustee and was a 4-H project leader.

Hurb started the Catch-it-Calf program for 4-H and supported it for years. He also started the pony rides at the carnival during the county fair. He had several ponies which put a lot of smiles on kids' faces. He was the Associate Bethel Guardian for Jobs Daughters, a Shrine Member and member of the Mounted Patrol.

Preceding Hurb in death were his parents; his son, Ronald Herbie; brother, Emmor Graves and sister, Bebe Graves Goerler.
