

Indians provide lots of excitement during girls game

Even though the final outcome was not what Sainty wanted, the Lady Indians provided a lot of excitement Thursday night. The St. Francis and Dundy County Ladies varsity basketball teams were tied at 45 when the whistle blew ending regulation time.

Unfortunately the Lady Tigers outscored the Lady Indians 9-2 in overtime to win the 54-47 contest.

The teams were not only tied after the fourth quarter they were also tied 19-19 at halftime.

The game, which was played in St. Francis, was the season opener.

"I felt like we played pretty well for our first game," Coach Ted Busse said. "We will work to improve in all facets of the game."

The team played Tuesday in Brewster at the Sagebrush Tournament against Golden Plains. Check Indians news for results and Friday game time.

Six Sainty Ladies found their way into the scoring column against Dundy County with Sidnee Crabtree pushing 13 points through the hoop. She hit three field goals and took advantage of the free-throw line, hitting seven of her 10 opportunities.

The Ladies started out strong scoring several points before Dundy County hit a basket. By the time the first quarter was over, the Lady Tigers had pulled ahead by two points (13-11).

First quarter baskets were recorded by Jami Pevler (2), Crabtree (2) and Andrea Holzwarth (1).

Elizabeth Gienger collected a point at the line.

Although the Sainty ladies attempted eight shots from beyond the arc they were unsuccessful each time. They did hit 16-of-48 field goals from two-point range for a 33.3 percent average. They were 51.7 percent at the line making 15-of-29.

The whole outcome of the game could have changed with a few more shots from the line falling in.

Having the best field-goal percentage was Holzwarth with 4-of-5 while Joni Pevler was 3-of-5 for 60 percent. At the line, Jami Pevler was the only player with 100 percent (2/2).

The girls had 16 steals compared to 18 turnovers. They pulled down 29 rebounds and had 16 assists. Crabtree led in steals with eight and also in assists with eight.

Foreign investors must report holdings

Angie Berens, County Executive director of the Cheyenne County Farm Service Agency, is reminding foreign investors who buy, sell or hold a direct or indirect interest in agricultural lands in the United States that they are required under the Agricultural Foreign Invest-

ment Disclosure Act to report their holdings and transactions to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

The Secretary of Agriculture has delegated the responsibility for collecting this information to the Farm Service Agency.

According to Mrs. Berens, for-

eign investors buying or selling land must report such transaction within 90 days of the date of the sale.

Failure to file an accurate or timely report can result in a penalty with fines up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the agricultural land.

Mrs. Berens said the act requires reports to be filed by:

- individuals who are not U.S. citizens or citizens of the Northern Mariana Islands or the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands;
- individuals who are not lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence or who are not paroled into the United

States under the Immigration and Nationality Act;

• any organization created under the laws of a foreign government or which has located its principal place of business outside the United States;

• any U.S. organization in which a significant interest or substantial control is directly or indirectly held by foreign individuals, organizations, or government; and

• any foreign governments. Farm Service Agency form FSA-153 is used to report land holdings and transactions. The completed form must be returned to the Farm Service Agency county office where the land is located.
