

Angie Berens, County Executive director of the Cheyenne County Farm Service Agency, is reminding foreign investors who buy, sell or hold a direct or indirect interest in agricultural lands in the United States that they are required under the Agricultural Foreign Invest-

ment Disclosure Act to report their eign investors buying or selling holdings and transactions to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

The Secretary of Agriculture has delegated the responsibility for collecting this information to the Farm Service Agency.

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
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
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
