Several reports presented to County Commissioners

The commissioners were told that the new 911 system equipment will be in on Monday, Dec. 17, dispatchers will start training Tuesday and they will start dispatching on Wednesday. When the decision was made to establish the 911-dispatch office in the courthouse, there were a few questions if it could be done before the first of the year.

"We did it," said Carol Gamblin, communications director.

All calls will go through the 911 system, she said.

She said much of the work had been done "in house" with Craig Van Allen doing a great deal of the work. The wiring had been installed the week before and she said it had been a tedious job and Ron Wieck and his helper had done a very well,

in the future. Deborah Farland, new St. Francis Chief of Police, introduced herself, then reported that she had hired one new officer and another would be hired after the first of the year. She also said that the base radio used in the city police office had been moved to the sheriff's office so they needed a new base radio.

The total for these items will cost \$1,595 and the money will be taken out of the 911 fund.

The commissioner again turned to paying the bill for the sheriff's deputy's training. The city of St. Francis had sent a bill of \$15,000 to the county for the training of Mike Blehm, who had started with the city, then transferred to the sheriff's office.

Earlier, an officer trained in the county's share of the house-Cheyenne County transferred to hold

After discussion, the commissioners agreed to sent a check for \$8,158.46, which is what it cost for Officer Blehm's salary during training.
