Dr. Warren J. "Barney" Boring, died on the evening of Jan. 11, 2008. He was born in rural Missouri on April 14, 1920. He attended Wyandotte High School in Kansas City, then went to the University of Kansas before enlisting in the Army at the start of World War II. He was wounded in Europe, several times, and was awarded three Purple Hearts. Following the war, he completed his bachelor's degree at Kansas State University in Manhattan.

Barney met his wife, Anne, in Hollywood, during a leave from the Army. They had five children, in four states. Those are William, Barbara, James, Sally and Nancy. There are six grandchildren, Casey (Maxwell), Molly (Folio), Amy (Cheng), Jeffrey, Brian and Kailana. Sally (Rice) was the one born in St. Francis.

graduation, Upon college Barney took a teaching position in St. Francis from 1947 to 1953. He became the wrestling coach, and led the high school team to four State Championships in the six years he was there! His little son Bill was the team mascot. That remarkable achievement (so many champions from such a small town) put Barney in the Kansas State Wrestling Hall of Fame. The late Catherine and Warren Gienger were instrumental in securing that recognition.

During the summers, Barney enrolled in the University of Colorado, in Boulder, culminating in a master's degree. James was born there in 1950. The family then moved to Bloomington, Ind., where Barney eventually received several degrees, including his doctorate.

He then accepted a professorship at Long Beach State College in California, which became California State University, Long Beach. He initiated the wrestling program there, and was instrumental in developing amateur wrestling in schools throughout southern California.

He was inducted into the university's Athletic Hall of Fame and received the sole standing ovation at the induction ceremony. As a professor emeritus, he was inducted into the National Wresting Association Hall of Fame.
