DOG RESIGTRATION, TAGGING AND **PENALTIES**

Every person within the city limits of the City of Bird City that owns a dog is required to have it tagged and registered. The fee is \$5.00, and must show proof of rabies shot. Any persons who shall fail to register a dog shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined the amount not exceeding

DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE It shall be unlawful for the owners allow any dogs to run at large in the City of Bird City. A dog shall be deemed running at large when it is off the premises of its owner except when it is accompanied and controlled by a leash. Violation of this section shall be punishable by a fine of not less than \$50.00 or more than \$100.00. The fine upon second violation shall not be less than \$75.00 or more than \$200.00. Upon subsequent violation the fine shall be not less than \$125.00 nor more than \$400.00.

LOUD OR NOISY DOGS

No person shall own a loud or frequent or habitual barking, howling or yelping dog that shall annoy or disturb any neighborhood. Each day that a dog engages in loud or frequent or habitual barking, howling or yelping that shall annoy or disturb any neighborhood shall be considered a separate violation. Violation of this section of this Ordinance shall be punishable by up to a fine of not less than \$50.00 or more than \$100.00
