GENERAL NOTICE TO CONTROL **NOXIOUS WEEDS**

The Kansas Noxious Weed Law K.S.A. 2-1314 et seq requires all persons who own or supervise land in Kansas to control and eradicate all weeds declared noxious by legislative action. The weeds declared noxious are: field bindweed, musk thistle, johnson grass, bur ragweed, Canada thistle, sericea lespedeza, leafy spurge, hoary cress, quack grass, Russian knapweed, kudzu and pignut. Bull thistle is a County Option Noxious Weed declared noxious by the Board of County Commissioners of Cheyenne County. Notice is hereby given pursuant to the Kansas Noxious Weed Law to every person who owns or supervises land in Cheyenne County that noxious weeds growing or found on such land shall be controlled and eradicated. Control is defined as preventing the production of viable seed and the vegetative spread of the plant.

Failure to observe this notice may result in the County:

1. Serving a legal notice requiring

control of the noxious weeds within a minimum of five days. Failure to control the noxious weeds within the time period allowed may result in the county treating the noxious weeds at the landowners expense and placing a lien on the property if the bill is not paid within 30 days or,

2. Filing criminal charges for non compliance. Conviction for non compliance may result in a fine of \$100 per day of non-compliance with a maximum fine of

The public is also hereby notified that it is a violation of the Kansas Noxious Weed Law to barter, sell or give away infested nursery stock or livestock feed unless the feed is fed on the farm where grown or sold to a commercial processor that will destroy the viability of the noxious weed seed. Custom harvesting machines must be labeled with a label provided by the Kansas Dept. of Agriculture and must be free of all weed seed and litter when entering the State and when leaving a field infested with noxious weeds. Spring Wheat – or Not?

With the high prices for spring wheat, it is incredibly tempting to want to try to raise spring wheat here in our area. There are lots of questions to why it isn't grown here. There has been some work by K-State completed in Colby in 2001 and 2004 that will address some of those questions.

This wheat was planted in late February and very early March. In Colby, the average yield of spring wheat was only 22 bushels per acre. Also the test weight averaged 49 pounds per bushel. The standard test weight for spring wheat is 58 pounds per bushel. Therefore, low yields and low test weights are a major concern.

The problem with spring wheat in our area is that it almost always turns hot and dry at the time the wheat is in grain fill. These conditions result in low test weight, shriveled grain and low yields. In addition, the protein quality of spring wheat from our area may be less than of that grown in the northern plains.

I have also had some questions about spring-planted winter wheat. Yields and test weights of wheat planted in the spring were even less than that of spring wheat. In some cases, winter wheat, even Jagger, yielded noth-

ing when planted in the spring. The problem with this late planting for winter wheat is also related to the hot dry conditions during grain fill.

In addition, marketing spring wheat could be quite the challenge in Kansas. Local markets are hard to find. Also if the spring wheat is shipped directly to northern drop locations, the normally low quality wheat produced in our area may result in lower prices than producers expect. Low test weight and poor protein quality are two of the major concerns.

Finally, even though the \$20 to \$25 spring wheat is tempting, the change is just not realistic.

harsh Kansas weather conditions just aren't conducive for producing good quality spring wheat that has good yields. I had one producer, who has a lot of history in wheat production in our area, told me that spring wheat in northwest Kansas at best — is a bust! The significant obstacles include low yields, low test weights, poor protein content, and lack of local markets.

According to Jim Shroyer, K-State wheat specialist, to think that hard red spring wheat produced in Kansas will bring the kind of prices seen on the Minneapolis Grain Ex-
