# Notice published to control weeds

Published in The Saint Francis Herald, St. Francis, Kansas, and the Bird City Times, Bird City, Kansas, Thursdays, March 13 and March 20, 2008. (11-12) GENERAL NOTICE TO CONTROL NOXIOUS WEEDS

The Kansas Noxious Weed Law K.S.A. 2-1314 et seq requires all persons who own or supervise land in Kansas to control and eradicate all weeds declared noxious by legislative action. The weeds declared noxious are: field bindweed, musk thistle, johnson grass, bur ragweed, Canada thistle, sericea lespedeza, leafy spurge, hoary cress, quack grass, Russian knapweed, kudzu and pignut. Bull thistle is a County Option Noxious Weed declared noxious by the Board of County Commissioners of Cheyenne County. Notice is hereby given pursuant to the Kansas Noxious Weed Law to every person who owns or supervises land in Cheyenne County that noxious weeds growing or found on such land shall be controlled and eradicated. Control is defined as preventing the production of viable seed and the vegetative spread of the plant.

Failure to observe this notice may result in the County

1. Serving a legal notice requiring

control of the noxious weeds within a minimum of five days. Failure to control the noxious weeds within the time period allowed may result in the county treating the noxious weeds at the landowners expense and placing a lien on the property if the bill is not paid within 30 days or,

2. Filing criminal charges for non compliance. Conviction for non compliance may result in a fine of \$100 per day of non-compliance with a maximum fine of \$1500.

The public is also hereby notified that it is a violation of the Kansas Noxious Weed Law to barter, sell or give away infested nursery stock or livestock feed unless the feed is fed on the farm where grown or sold to a commercial processor that will destroy the viability of the noxious weed seed. Custom harvesting machines must be labeled with a label provided by the Kansas Dept. of Agriculture and must be free of all weed seed and litter when entering the State and when leaving a field infested with noxious weeds. #### **Health Fair**

The Annual Spring Community Health Fair in Wray will be held Saturday, April 19, at the Wray Rehabilitation and Activities Center (WRAC). This is an annual event sponsored by the Wray Community District Hospital and Clinic, and the Wray Lions Club. See ad in this issue of the Herald.

The Health Fair will offer community members various screenings, education, and evaluation of lab results with the local medical staff. Optional blood testing is available prior to the Health Fair. This testing includes a full general health chemistry including cholesterol, glucose, blood count, and thyroid levels. There is a fee. Please remember, you must fast 12 hours prior to this test and drink plenty of water!

For an additional fee, gentlemen interested in receiving a PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) test may include this in the general blood test. This test is utilized in detecting prostate cancer and is recommended annually for men over 50 (sooner for those at high risk).

All test results will be distributed at the Wray Health Fair. If participants are unable to attend the health fair, the test results will be mailed the following week along with a flyer explaining the results.

All participants are encouraged to make their doctors visits after the health fair as the results will not be able released until April 19. Due to regulations, they cannot offer additional blood testing with health fair blood work, so you will need a separate appointment for these tests.

All blood tests must by completed prior to the Health Fair. Blood draws will be performed at the Wray Community District Hospital from Monday, March 24, through Wednesday, April 16, from 6 a.m. to 9:30 a.m.

Blood draws will also be available at the Idalia Visions Center Thursday, March 27, Thursday, April 3 and Tuesday, April 8 from 7a.m. to 9:30 a.m.

Please note that there will be no blood draws offered in Wray on March 27, April 3, and April 8 as staff will be in Idalia on those days.

Appointments are highly encouraged as space is limited to 85 participants daily. To make an appointment for your blood test, please call the Wray Hospital at 332-4811.
