Also, my Grandma Henderson has been like Jamie in many ways. She struggled through heart diseases, during periods of sickness and in health. She's underwent many operations to cure her breast cancer and help her heart.

Even though nothing of the sort has happened to me, I feel like I know somewhat what Landon went through trying to take care of his love of his life, Jamie Sullivan. Because of this, I feel like we share a sense of sadness towards our family members.

I noticed while reading this book that tomorrow is never guaranteed and we need to live each day to the fullest. I learned this also when my grandpa died in a car accident in 2004. My grandpa and I were very close and we used to do everything together. When I found out that he was killed in the accident, I felt much like Landon did after he found out that Jamie was dying. Hurt, angry, sad, and not to mention depressed were some of the feelings I felt. I wanted to blame myself for not being there telling him to put his seat belt on to keep him from getting thrown from the vehicle. I still feel the same way now that I did the day it happened. It was an experience that will stick with me for the rest of my life just as it will with Landon.

In conclusion, this was one of the best books I have ever read during the 15 years of my life. It helped me to cope with the catastrophes that have hit my family over the years. A Walk to Remember helped me know that I'm not alone and there are people that are worse off than me. Thanks you for writing this book for others and for me.


