LaVoine Thomas Collicott was

born Dec. 1, 1914, at his parents' sod dugout homestead, located in the canyons, 3 miles south of Haigler, Neb., in Cheyenne County, Kan. He was one of

three children, and the only son, born to Charlie Thomas Collicott and Glena Alice (Workman) Collicott. His life of 93 years, 4 months and 15 days ended April 15, 2008, at Hillcrest Care Center, Wray, Colo.

At the age of $2 \frac{1}{2}$ years, LaVoine moved into the town of Haigler with his parents and his older sister, Elsie. A few years later, a younger sister, DeVeta, was born into the family. He spent all of his childhood days in Haigler...growing up in the little white stucco house that still stands at the corner of Atkinson Avenue and Norfold Street.

LaVoine attended the Haigler Public Schools. In these early years, he assisted his father with farming and operating a gas station on the Nebraska/Kansas state line. He told the story of being robbed, at gunpoint, while he was running the station alone one day. In later years, he also helped his parents with their dairy farm and milk deliveries.

LaVoine loved music and played banjo in the local community band and for many dances.

But, as most young men want to do, he also wanted to leave home and see some of the world. So, he packed his bags and went to Denver, Colo. and worked as an elevator boy on the night shift at the Albany Hotel.

He was dating Opal Myer at the time, and she worked summers at the Tecker Family Forest Inn, near Estes Park, Colo., and they would meet in Estes Park. But, he missed Haigler, returning soon after his Denver adventure.

Brown farm at Sanborn; and returned to the Village of Haigler to work for Dundy County, maintaining roads in the county for the next 24 years. It was often said that nobody could do a good road like LaVoine. In 1971, LaVoine was named Dundy County Roads Superintendent by the Dundy County Commissioners. He fulfilled his duties in this job until his retirement in 1980 at age 65. During some of

these years, he also worked evenings at the McKay Phillips 66 Gas Station on Highway 34 in

Haigler. In addition to receiving his license as Dundy County Roads Superintendent from the State of Nebraska in 1971, LaVoine was recognized July 7, 1998, for his 50 years of membership in the Haigler United Methodist Church. In January, 2006, he was awarded a 75-years membership pin from the Royal Neighbors of America

LaVoine's interests and hobbies always kept him busy. He loved to hunt, fish, boat and go camping. At age 85, he was still shooting his own deer. From tent camping in the Rocky Mountains and elk hunting in his earlier years to all the fishing trips with campers at Sutherland Reservoir, Trenton Lake and Rock Creek Lake, he loved the outdoors.

LaVoine was also a master gardener and always knew when to plant potatoes.

In earlier years, he enjoyed videotaping his home, his family and all their activities together, and the nature around him. Through his patience and by the examples he set, LaVoine instilled in each of his children and grandchildren this appreciation of nature.

Feb. 19, 1915 - March 22, 2008 Services were held for David Edwin Williams, 93, of Forest Grove, Ore., who died Saturday, March 22, 2008, in his home.

Mr. Williams was born Feb. 19, 1915, in Franklin, Neb., the son of Frank E. Williams and Lucy Mae (Alexander) Williams. At the age of 3, he moved with his family to Bird City, Kan., where he was raised and received his education at Frontier Country School, Number 26.

He married Aileen R. McDaniel on June 9, 1934, in Goodland.

Mr. Williams worked in the farming industry, settling down in Bird City in western Kansas to raise a family. In 1937, a crop of wheat was ready to harvest, when black clouds of change boiled up across the Kansas prairie, and a hailstorm took away their hopes of a harvest. Without an income and the Dust Bowl Depression dashing the hopes of much of America, they set out to the west.

They lived in Bird City until 1940, when they moved to LaGrande, Ore. In September of 1940, they moved to Springfield, Ore, where they lived for 57 years. They moved to Forest Grove, Ore., in June, 1997.

After moving to Oregon, he worked for Georgia Pacific Lumber Co., and later, the Rosboro Lumber Co. as a plywood panel patcher until 1980, when he retired.

He belonged to the Forest Grove Gospel Hall, where he had served as an elder.

He enjoyed music, playing the guitar and five-string banjo and singing bluegrass songs.

His brother, Robert Williams, preceded him in death.

He is survived by his wife of 73 years, Aileen R. Williams, of the family home in Forest Grove; his daughters, Janice I. Singleton of Cornelius, Ore.; Donna M Goff and Ruth J. Students inducted into honor society


