Greg Kite, former St. Francis resident and president of the Historic Preservation Alliance of Wichita and Sedgwick County, attended the board meeting.

"I was elated with the decision!" he said. "This is the culmination of nearly two years of very hard work and Sawhill Park is only the second such designation in Cheyenne County after the courthouse."

Mr. Kite said that since Sawhill Park was approved by the Sites Board of Review, as well as the State Historic Preservation officer, the property will be listed on the Kansas Register of Historic Places. He also said that because the property was approved for state register listing and is being nominated to the National Register, the board will forward its recommendations for listing to the National Park Service in Washington. He also said that notice will be received from the Kansas State Historical Society about the National Register list in three to five months.

"The really great thing about all of this is that it was truly a group effort," he said.

The original idea of placing the park on the historic register was that of Scott Schultz, St. Francis Mayor, who asked Mr. Kite to become involved.

Thereafter, J.R. Landenberger, city superintendent, prepared an initial draft of the preliminary site information questionnaire. Subsequently, Terry Miller, county clerk, and Mr. Kite prepared the final version of the questionnaire

and submitted it to the State for

After the State indicated that it was eligible for designation, the arduous task of preparing the actual nomination of the Howard T. Sawhill Park to both the State and National Historic Registers was begun.

Many hours were spent by Margaret Bucholtz, Saint Francis Herald columnist, and Janet Carman, vice president of the Cheyenne County Historical Society, at the Cheyenne County Museum. They researched old Saint Francis Herald articles to obtain the necessary information. Mike Day, the city attorney, provided a full and complete legal description for the park, and confirmed its ownership by the county and the long-term, 50-year lease to the City.

Superintendent Landenberger provided current photos of the park and Clerk Miller assisted Mr. Kite taking measurements of the band shell, amphitheatre, center fountain and memorial American flag. Official letters of approval for the nomination were prepared by Clerk Miller and Mary Lampe, city clerk.


Those who have changed their name by marriage, divorce or legal proceedings or have changed their residence, need to register before they can vote. Also, those
