



After posting an individual record of 6-5-1 during the regular season, the freshman flipped a switch when it mattered the most.

Miss Zimbelman, whose mother got her involved in showing horses at the age of 5, helped K-State secure a third-place finish in the reining event at the Varsity National Championship by going 3-1 against some of the country's top rider, a rare occurrence for a freshman in an event as specialized
