

"Parents and Anger" Anger is a normal human emotion, experienced by all ages for many reasons. Misdirected anger can cause hurt feelings, undermining of relationships, and sometimes result in physical harm. Being a parent is very stressful; brothers and sisters fight with each other, babies cry, and toddlers like to say "no" a lot. In addition there are the stresses of daily life including a lack of sleep, job stress, too much to do and too little time. It is not surprising that a parent can feel overwhelmed and react angrily. Unfortunately their children are often the targets of that anger. Even though parents strive to be a good parent, it is not realistic to expect to be perfect. Even the best of parents occasionally lose their temper. Consider the following:
