







Rain slows harvest

By Karen Krien karen.k@nwkansas.com It rained less than an inch in many areas around St. Francis Sunday night and more on Monday night. That, along with a muggy, cloudy day on Monday kept most harvesters out of the wheat fields. The elevator managers reported no loads coming in during the day.

Harvest began in full force last week but rain slowed the cutting on Wednesday and again Sunday and Monday nights. While the corn, feed and pastures welcome the rain, the farmers are anxious to get the grain out of the field as quickly as possible.

Yields have varied. Elevator managers said they have heard farmers having yields from 20 to 30 bushels to 50 and 60 bushels per acre. Variances depended on when the field received rain. This year, the rain was spotty, giving one field ample amounts and the field across the road would get nothing or very little.

Randy Holzwarth, St. Francis, said one of his fields in Sherman County had little rain and some hail so didn't have very good yields. However, he noted that there is good wheat in the northwest part of the county.

Dick Bursch, Bird City, said his wheat fields south of Bird City did very well despite the lack of rain. **Price drops**

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The price of wheat and corn has been at an all-time high at \$12.60 per bushel and \$6.87 per bushel, respectively.

However, on Monday, wheat had dropped 50 cents, Closing price on Tuesday was \$7.70 per bushel.
