A specific project application to be discussed is the rehabilitation of homes for low-tomoderate income families. AN ORDINANCE ATTESTING TO AN INCREASE IN TAX REVENUES FOR BUDGET YEAR 2009 FOR THE CITY OF

WHEREAS CITY OF BIRD CITY must continue to provide services to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of this community; and

WHEREAS, the cost of providing essential services to the citizens of this city

continues to increase. NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Governing Body of the CITY OF BIRD

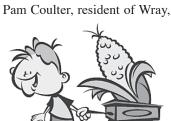

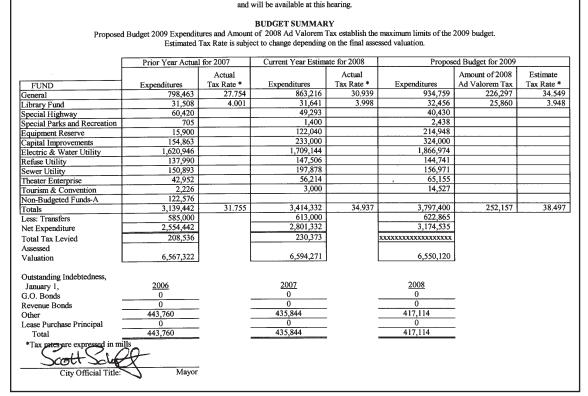
