He noted that in the 1850s, the country's greatest wealth was considered the rural areas. By the 1870s, there had been a change and the urban areas were considered the country's greatest wealth. That had been the start of the industrial revolution.

Cheyenne County became involved with Farm Bureau in 1919. At that time, they were among the other 38 Farm Bureau counties.


