## Hospital buys a monitoring system

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A cardiac monitoring system was purchased when the Cheyenne County Hospital Board met on Sept.

Tenille Lee, director of nursing, had a presentation on the cardiac monitors. She said the current equipment is obsolete and the only replacement/repair parts the staff can get are refurbished.

The nursing staff has reported interference with the wireless system that is now found in some areas. Mrs. Lee said the new equipment would operate off a designated frequency so the staff would no longer have the interference.

She had information on four dif-\$80,988; Welch Allyn, \$108,652.71; Datascope, \$121,539.20; and Fakuda Denshi, \$74,647.08.

She recommended the Nihon Kohden for several reasons:

- It has the 72-hour storage. • It has a 5-year warranty.

The board agreed to purchase the Nihon Kohden monitoring system.

In the future, Les Lacy, hospital administrator, said there may be a need to look at upgrading the CT machine. The CT was purchased in September 2004, and was on a 5-year lease which is up next

Our current model, he said, uses single slice technology. He showed the board images from the hospital's machine and a 16-slice machine, indicating that the next machine would need to be a step forward in technology.

Administrator Lacy reported that the accounts receivable is up due to the higher volume.

The funded depreciation has been repaid \$300,000. However, the hospital still owes the account \$142,000. He said he hopes to be able to repay this slowly following the interim cost report.

The Medicaid and charity care contractuals have gone up a little too, he said. The St. Francis Clinic net patient service revenue was up as were expenses.

# Legislature meets to pass resolutions

Silver-Haired Legislature met during the week of Sept. 29 to pass some resolutions and to recommend laws for the state legislature to consider in the upcoming



sessions. Rick Reeser, St. Francis, the county's representative said that the legislature passed the following resolutions and bills:

- Resolution 2501 urged the legislature to help combat predatory payday lending practices and predatory practices by consumer loan agencies and income tax refund advance lending practices that adversely affect elderly and other residents of Kansas.
- Resolution 2501 supported increased funding for Home and Community Based Service programs and nutrition programs.
- Resolution 2503 requested that cities and counties with traffic signals adjust the timing of traffic lights at crosswalks so seniors and those with disabilities have adequate time to cross.
- Bill 2504 provided mandatory reinstatement of certain insurance policies.
- Bill 2505 will put an excise tax on wind generated electricity with proceeds to go to the Senior Services Trust Fund for senior service funding.
- Resolution 2506 will support the Kansas Silver Plan which is modeled after the Amber Alert Plan. The Silver Plan will alert and broadcast a search and rescue effort when elderly people, unable to care for themselves, wander
- Resolution 2507 urged amend-



ments to medical scholarships laws to provide assistance for geriatric fellowships.

Silver-Haired Legislature is a Kansas mandated body that meets annually to recommend laws and resolutions that can improve the lives of seniors. It is an unfunded mandate, so donations to the Silver-Haired Legislators are appre-



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
