

## Second district game played

betty.w@nwkansas.com Fans who enjoy an offensive football game were happy at Greene Field on Friday night.

The final score was St. Francis 68, Wichita County 32. The two teams, both called Indians, put on an offensive display which totaled 100 points when the two scores

were combined. The St. Francis game, which totaled 386 yards rushing, was supplemented by four completed passes for an added 68 yards, while Wichita County used the air effectively for 299 yards and added 43 yards on the ground. The Wichita County quarterback had 44 passing attempts and

completed 32. "Wichita County has a good quarterback," Coach Tim Lambert said. "He put most of his passes on the money. A lot of times we were just a hair away. They have a

couple of really good players. "They didn't run very often but when they did we stopped them."

Many times if St. Francis fans are a few minutes late for the game, they miss the first Sainty touchdown. To open the game, Wichita County received a Tyler Lauer kickoff and went to the air immediately.

On this night, it was Wichita County who used four passes on the opening drive to post the first score. A St. Francis holding penalty on the third pass resulted in a first down. The fourth pass resulted in a 52-yard touchdown play. The time on the clock was 10:47. Wichita County had the first six points of the game. St. Francis blocked the kick for the extra point.

St. Francis then began their offensive game using Trent Raile, Adam Guthmiller, Trevor Hilt and Cody Sherlock to take the hand offs from Matt Raile. Trent Kinen had taken the kickoff back to the 30-yard line. This first drive did not result in a touchdown as after making a couple of first downs, an unsuccessful fourth down play stopped the forward motion.

in their next series and was forced to punt the ball. This is when T. Raile took the punt return and with the help of his blockers dashed 72-yards for the first St. Francis score. A M. Raile pass to Jesse Pacheco gave the home team an 8-6 advantage.

After a short Wichita County series, the Sainty Indians again began to move the ball. They were moving steadily toward the goal line when the quarter ended.

The first quarter had the least amount of scoring in the game but the second quarter was all

Less than 2 minutes into the second quarter, Sainty had finished their drive with a Hilt 1-yard run into the end zone. He also scored the conversion points giving Sainty a 16-6 advantage. This was the first of four touchdowns for

A long kickoff by Alex Long forced Wichita County to collect the ball on the 3-yard line, making it back to the 15 before being tackled.

It was during this series that an interception by M. Raile gave the Sainty fans a chance to cheer. St. Francis took advantage of this play starting at their own 35-yard line. The clock said 8:32 when T. Raile entered the end zone. The conversion pass failed but Sainty had a 22-6 lead.

Wichita County came right back with their passing game and 3 minutes later they had six more points on their side of the scoreboard, making it 22-12.

Terrence Lamb took the return for Sainty and besides runs by T. Raile, Sherlock and Hilt, M. Raile added a run to the 9-yard line on a quarterback keeper. It took three first downs and 3 minutes before Sainty had their third score of the quarter. This time Hilt took the ball in from 4 yards out with the conversion being unsuccessful. It was now 28-12.

Wichita County did not hold the ball long as T. Raile caught one of their passes and Sainty put together another scoring drive. Wichita County was ineffective T. Raile had a first-down rushing

gain in this series but the score came on a M. Raile to J. Pacheco pass. It was a 13-yard touchdown play. T. Raile added two points

and the Sainty Indians had 36. It was near the end of the first half, but Wichita County took the kickoff into the end zone on a 72-yard return play, making the half-time score 36-18.

When the second quarter was completed it showed St. Francis had added four touchdowns and two good conversion completions for 28 points and Wichita County had two touchdowns for 12

The scoring was not over yet as the third quarter was also

productive. St. Francis received the ball to begin the second half and they used their running game to maintain possession of the ball. There were a number of 5, 6 or 7 yard gains by Sherlock, Hilt and T. Raile to keep the momentum going. The drive ended with Hilt scoring on an 11-yard run. T. Raile scored two additional points making Sainty's score 44.

Wichita County never let up the pressure though. They went on their own scoring drive aided by a St. Francis penalty. The quarter was half over when they scored on a 6-yard run and added an extra point on the after-touchdown kick. Sainty now led 44-25.

One more score took place in this quarter. Lamb took the ball on the kickoff and play began on the 37-yard line. A flag brought a touchdown play back but Sainty prevailed. The drive included a first down run by Sherlock and a completed pass to J. Pacheco. Sherlock scored on a 2-yard run at 3:07 with T. Raile completing the conversion attempt. Sainty now had a 52-25 advantage.

Wichita County had the ball on first-and-goal when the quarter

The fourth quarter began with a Wichita County touchdown and a successful kick for their final points of the game. They now stood at 32 points.

intercepted a pass. Again St. Francis took advantage of a defensive play by posting another score. A face-mask penalty Wichita County also gave Sainty yardage. Hilt went in for the final home town score on a 19-yard run. Sherlock made the conversion run and St. Francis had a total of 68 points.

The last few minutes of the game were highlighted by a pass interception by Long, who took the ball to the end zone. Unfortunately the officials called the ball back due to a penalty. Sainty had a 68-32 District 15 win.

Three Sainty players had over 100 yards rushing in this game, Sherlock led with 117 on 25 carries while Hilt had 109 yards on 18 carries and T. Raile 105 yards on 16 carries. Sainty had five penalties for 55

yards while Wichita County had nine for 80 yards. Twenty-five first downs were
