Department has new leader

The Cheyenne County Health Department has a new leader.

Mila Bandel, registered nurse, filled the position after Susan Roelfs resigned. She will be working 24 hours a week in the health office located in the basement of the clinic in St. Francis as well as in the Bird City office one-half day a week. Days and hours include: St. Francis - Tuesdays through Thursdays, 8:30 to 4:30. When a second person is hired for the department, she will be at the Bird City Clinic on Wednesdays from 9 to noon.

Mrs. Bandel said, at the Thursday Cheyenne County Hospital Board meeting, that she likes working with all age groups in the county.

"In county health, there is something different every day," she said.

"It is a positive position with so many programming educational opportunities that can be done to help people."

In the absence of a county health nurse, several of the programs, including the KAN Be Healthy program and childhood immunizations were moved upstairs to the clinic. She thinks this is an ideal work arrangement and is looking forward to working closely with the clinic staff and providers.

She plans to increase the activity and patients coming into the department. She said she is already writing a column, "Moments with Mila," for the local newspapers. This will give her the opportunity to introduce new programs, information on diseases, vaccinations and other educational programming available.

With winter and the flu season approaching, she has been busy giving flu shots. Two clinics were held in order to help people get their flu shots and she has been going to the schools, the courthouse and local businesses as well as giving the immunizations to individuals who come to the department.

On Nov. 12, the first diabetes workshop will be held. These meetings will be held on a monthly basis in the basement conference room at the St. Francis Clinic. The workshop will help people with nutrition, foot and hand care, insulin pumps and

there will diabetes handouts available. Susie Walz, diabetes educator will also be present.

Mrs. Bandel has been visiting the Cheylin schools catching up students and staff on tetanus injections. She plans to be at the senior centers each month to take blood pressures and do blood sugar screenings.

She is working with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment on reporting spreadable diseases. A school newsletter has been developed for student educators as well as school enrichment programs. The letter deals with nutrition, personal hygiene and other health issues.

There are environmental hazards which Mrs. Bandel sees as needing attention. She has been working with the Head Start program on lead screening as well as working with providers on high levels of lead found in blood systems of clients.

Again, working with the clinic staff, they are developing the Early Works Detection program where breast and cervical cancer screenings for 40- to 64-year-old women are held for women who do not have health insurance or fall below a set income level. Women who qualify and have no insurance will be able to have these screenings at no charge.

Each month, Mrs. Bandel devotes 8 hours to the Emergency Preparedness Bioterrorism planning. In April, there will be a Point of Distri-

bution meeting in St. Francis. The department works on a tight budget. The county gives around \$10,000 and there are grants which are applied for yearly.

"My revenue consists of educational teaching and resources, rather than bringing in money," she said. "There is not much cash flow but, rather, preventing disease."

She said that, if there is a question, she has the resources to find the answers.

Recently, there have been mothers asking about Gardisil which is a cervical cancer vaccine available to young girls. This is the subject of one of her Moments With Mila

"I want people to come into the office. There are resources available to the public free or with a minimal charge. There are publications, testings, screenings for lead, blood sugar, anemia, just to name a few. She makes home visits, and, in the near future, will be doing home visits with mothers and babies.

"Many people don't realize that, in the department, we have car seats and breast pumps available," she

"I love my job. I have a nice facility to work in and the clinic and hospital staff are great to work along side with."

In the future, there will be a number of programs available including: family planning, child birthing classes, including nutrition contests; help with school screenings (scoliosis, hearing and vision); more nutritional programs and working more with the women, infant, children local programs (WIC).

"All four providers working with the clinic and hospital are willing to help in any program matter and provide additional health support to my department, whether it be advice or lending a hand with a patient," she said. "They make being a nurse very enjoyable.'

Mrs. Bandel and her husband, Matt, who is a farmer, have two daughters, Kyla and Karly. She came to Cheyenne County as a county Extension agent. Several years ago, she resigned and went to school where she earned a registered nurse degree. She has been working at the hospital and will continue to work there at least one day a month.






