Digital microfilm reader/ printer purchased

A long awaited and much needed digital microfilm reader/printer was recently installed at the Cheyenne County Museum. It will benefit everyone interested in genealogy and family research. Historical Society members approved the purchase of this equipment at their August meeting. Money to fund the purchase came from the Dilsaver Trust.

This microfilm reader allows history researchers to select

and print items such as news articles and obituaries from old county newspapers. The search for family information is much easier if some names, dates or places are provided. If you need family information, Margaret Bucholtz, museum director, or a trained museum volunteer, will help you with your search. The museum is closed for the winter, but you can call 332-2040 or 332-3569 for an appointment.

A few of the county newspapers available on microfilm are listed here: Kansas Eagle 1897 -1902; Cheyenne County Rustler 1886-1889; Bird City Times from late 1800's; Weekly Review; Bird City Frontiersman 1880's; People's Defender 1892-1894; Cheyenne County Citizen; Cella Enterprise 18851888; St. Francis Herald. In addition to newspapers, there are some census records on file.

Barn Fest in Goessel Stan and I attended the 2008 Barn Fest sponsored by the Kansas Barn Alliance in Goessel in September. Caitlyn Meives from the Kansas Historical Society spoke about the 352 barns that were surveyed in 2007. Four Cheyenne County barns were included in that survey. "Quite frankly, I am stunned!" he said.

He added that preparing the registration form, photographs and attachments for the nomination of the Howard T. Sawhill Park to the National Register was a group effort. He said that the city government, county government, members of the Cheyenne County Historical Society and members of the community all contributed.

With the State and National Historic Register Listing, Sawhill Park is now eligible for Heritage Trust Fund Grants from the State of Kansas for restoration.

Ruben was born in St. Francis to Nick and Lydia (Orth) Schorzman and Betty was born in Goodland to M.B. and Fern Maring.


Ruben moved from Sainty to follow his brothers, Clarence and Emil, to Missouri and met Betty,




