Students rate at the top again

St. Francis schools have received Standard of Excellence awards in reading, math and the Building Standard of Excellence for reading and math.

The Kansas State Department of Education recently announced the recipients of the 2008 Standard of Excellence Awards, which are given for outstanding achievement on the Kansas Assessments. The award is given to schools and individual classes within schools which meet a very rigorous rubric dealing with Kansas's assessment

"Overall, the assessments were great," said Rob Schiltz, superintendent. "Everyone, our students and teachers, are doing a fine

Grades tested were third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and 11th. Those receiving the award in reading were grades third, fourth, seventh, eighth and 11th. The award for math was received in seventh and eighth grades.

Grades tested in science were fourth, seventh and 11th and grades seventh and 11th were recognized with the award.

Because of the individual classes scoring as well as they did, the schools received the Building Standard of Excellence award for reading in the elementary school and juniorsenior high school, math at the junior-senior high school, and science at the junior-senior high
