Board discusses finances

dublinls@hotmail.com The November Cheyenne County Fair Board meeting opened with Dick Bursch, president, presenting to the members he was not sure about the treasurer's report. Mr. Bursch had talked to Lacy Reed, treasurer, the day before the Thursday meeting and Mrs. Reed assured him the report would be ready for the meeting and if she could not be at the meeting, she would call and give the report to him.

Mr. Bursch said during the conversation, Mrs. Reed did say she might have to take Trevor, her son, to Denver; however, she would give him a call. He had not received the call from her and could not give the treasurer's report.

Mr. Bursch continued by saying the board has received two outstanding bills and felt they should be paid.

One bill was for \$240 to Colglazier's Trucking Company from Burlington, for hauling 30 hogs to Beatrice, Neb., after the fair and the other bill was for \$152 to KLOE radio station for advertisement.

Gary Cooper, secretary, reported that Linda Elfers, Extension secretary, brought him some bills right after Trevor Reed was hurt in the automobile accident. He told the members that he understands that Mrs. Reed has a lot on her plate.

Moreover, one of the bills was from the Colglazier's Trucking Company and when Mr. Cooper mentioned it to her, she said she felt that the trucking company did not pick the hogs up when they should have and set the bill aside.

Clay Zimbleman, board member, said that it all goes back to how much the hogs lost in weight while traveling 14 hours to Beatrice, Neb.

"I feel that it may have created a bad rapport from the fair board to the trucking company," said Mr.

He wanted to assure the members that there was money in the account he was not sure of the exact amount. Mr. Bursch said only one person has not paid \$220 from the sale. He feels it was an oversight and will contact

Kitchen repairs Mr. Bursch reported the fire damage in the grounds kitchen had been repaired and is better than before the fire. The walls have been scrubbed and no remainder of the damage is noticeable, except in the corner. This is where the fire was the hottest and it is still black.

The stove cost \$579 with the possibility there will be a prorate on the stove, because the damaged stove was nearly new.

The 4-H copier had been damaged and Mr. Bursch said he was waiting to hear from Joe Leibbrandt, Extension agent, to see what Mr. Leibbrandt wanted to do. Mr. Leibbrandt, he said, has taken pictures and talked to the insurance adjuster. He added that it was not the responsibility of the fair board, but he would follow up by talking to the adjuster.

Painting labor from Keith Peter and Jim Laffond was \$1,425. The special kill chemical for odor and cover was \$115 a case. The primer and paint was \$79. The tape, paper, masking tape, caulking and cleaner were \$28. The sheet rock was \$27. With the deductible of a \$1,000 and \$500 already paid, not much remains to be paid.

Locks to be changed

At this point, Mr. Bursch said he would like to have the locks on buildings at the fairgrounds changed again. It has been only four years since the last change, but keys are

"There are so many keys floating around and the board has no idea who has one," said Mr. Bursch.

Mr. Zimbleman agreed the locks needed to be changed, but how are the keys going to be kept track of in the future. A concern was the master keys were being duplicated without board approval.

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
