





Christmas opening set for Friday

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It will be like a fairy wonderland as the sixth Light Parade comes down St. Francis' Main Street starting at 6 p.m. on Friday. What makes it even more spectacular, is the floats will go back up the street so people won't miss anything on the float.

People are asked to not move their cars until the parade has gone back up the street to the school.

There have been reports of people making their floats in garages and storage buildings. There should be more lights, maybe more music and, at the end, Santa Claus.

The parade is one of the activities marking the Christmas Opening in St. Francis sponsored by the St. Francis Area Chamber of Commerce. Gloria Bracelin, Chamber secretary, reminds people, who are still undecided about what their float will be, that there is no theme — just Christmas. Entries can be floats, four wheelers, horse and buggies, hay racks, walking individuals — The limits of an entry are endless.

There are two rules: 1) no Santas on floats (it may confusing to small children if there is more than the "real" Santa at the end of the parade); and no candy thrown (it is dark and drivers may not see a child dart out after candy and there could be an accident).

At the end of the parade, Santa will hop off his ride at First National Bank where he will be talking to children and giving out

candy. This is an opportune time for parents and grandparents to bring their cameras for that special photo.

Remember to vote

Secretary Bracelin reminds people to vote for their favorite float. Entries can be picked up and left at Owens True Value, Stuart's Jewelry, Schultz's, Sainty Stitches, Donna's Gift Palace, Main St. Coffee and Ross Manufacturing.

The entry with the most votes will receive the People's Choice Award and will have the honor of displaying the plaque for the next

year. Last year's winner was Lampe Hardware with a spectacular display of fireworks.

Other activities

Other activities on Friday include: the Treasure Hunt, collecting tickets for drawings to be held on Dec. 15, a soup supper, and shopping and visiting with friends and neighbors. The Knights of Columbus will have their drawing for meat after the parade in front of Owens True Value. The St. Francis Girl Scouts will also be holding a candy/nut sale at Main St. Coffee.

Lodge open for hunters

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The charred rubble is now a steel pole building. The smell of smoke has been replaced by knotty pine planks and the burned stubble field has produced another crop.

It has been a long year, said Rex Murray, but we are back in business.

A year ago on Nov. 15, a fire started in the farm shop and hunting lodge owned by Rex and Sandi Murray, located halfway between Goodland and Wheeler. Rex had worked the month of October 2007 getting the lodge ready for hunters as well as a place to celebrate a large family Thanksgiving. Needless to say, Thanksgiving dinner wasn't held there and it was hard for Rex to recognize that there was something to be thankful for.

After the fire, he said that he just didn't think he would rebuild. However, that was before friends and acquaintances changed things around.

The Murrays run a pheasant hunting/dog business as well as raising Vizsla hunting dogs. Throughout the year, there are state and national contests hosted by the Murrays.

They had met many people

through competitions as well as those who had come to stay, hunt and compete on their grounds.

Shortly after the devastation of the fire, friends and hunters began showing up to help clear the dam-

age. Then, with encouragement from many, the Murrays began to start planning to build.

building. Those plans were sent to a friend in Cheyenne, Wyo., who plugged them into a computer so they would know what materials they needed. The building consists of three main areas: the lodge/kitchen/office; the breezeway through the middle; and on the east, a shop where Mr. Murray works on his farm machinery.

Because funds were limited, the Murrays, with the help of Ryan, their daughter Crystal and husband Travis, did the majority of the work themselves. They had contacted a mill in South Dakota where they bought the 12-foot long planks of tongue-and-groove knotty pine. The cement floor that was in the old building was used. When it came to refurbishing it, Betty and Robin Petersen, with Western Auction, notified them when furniture was going to be on an auction. They also kept them informed on good tool sales as all of the tools had been destroyed in the fire.

Rex said there were also local people who donated tools, equipment and money to purchase needed items.

The day of the barn raising found some of their hunting buddies on hand to build as well as Tom Bandel with his tractor and scoop helping with the rafters. The pine paneling covers the walls and ceiling. The kids helped put up the ceiling paneling while some other hunting friends helped with the sides.

The cement floor had holes in it, left from the heat of the fire. One day, some hunters came from Washington State and Denver. They asked Rex what he was going to do about the holes. He said he honestly didn't know what to do with them.

After a day of hunting, the guys went into town and picked up some materials. They were Quik-Crete concrete specialists and the holes were fixed before they went to bed that night.

Rex said it was hard to put up the building because there wasn't a tool left after the fire.

"I didn't even have a hammer or a screw driver or a saw," he said. Everything had to be purchased.

On Jan. 15, 60 days after the fire, the building was up. Today, the lodge has a "homey" atmosphere with several seating areas and televisions. There are tables and chairs where hunters and families can meet to eat and talk. There is a high ledge on the west side of the room which has antique memorabilia and, at the far end, is a tin washtub which displays the remains of the guns after the fire. The kitchen is open with an eating bar. The Murrays said they had to buy a new stove and television — the rest of the furniture and appliances were used when purchased.

They have had some mounted pheasants donated since the fire. Several weeks ago, a hunter who is also a taxidermist, brought two mounted fighting pheasants (they had been taken from Murray ground). They are placed on a log with Ringneck Country carved in it. It is one of the

highlights in the room.

Rex's office is still unfinished but, when he has time, it will be a place where he can conduct business. The breezeway will soon have four overhead doors and the area will be used for a number of activities.

People have been so good to us, he said.

In the fire, he lost all of his guns (some with sentimental value), trophies, pictures and a jacket he had received when he took first and second at the National Championship of the Upland Classic Series, a hunting competition. Of all the things he lost, he mourned the loss of this jacket as it could never be replaced (or so he thought).

Word of the destroyed jacket was received by one of the owners of National Upland Classic. In December, Mrs. Murray received a call asking if she remembered what the lettering was on the jacket?

"I said I could tell them as I had a picture of him and the jacket in front of me," she said.

In March, at National Upland Classic in Missouri, Rex was given a second jacket, a replica of the original.

Often times, as he talked, Rex's emotions were near the breaking point and he said he has only thanks to give for what he has and for the many, many friends he has made and those who supported and encouraged him at his lowest point.

The Murrays still have most of their dogs but one of them died shortly after the fire. Two others suffered from smoke inhalation. The kennel was burned in the fire but he and a neighbor were able to save the dogs by stuffing them into a dog trailer, cars and pickups — anywhere that was safe. The two dogs which had smoke inhalation went on to win two national championships this year.

The three cabins used for hunters and guests were not destroyed in the fire. The cosy little cabins can sleep up to 12 people and have kitchen and bathroom facilities. In time, Rex plans to have a walkway from the lodge to the cabins which will make it more convenient.

The lodge is available to not only hunters but is an ideal place to hold meetings, small conventions and family gatherings. The cabins are also available.
