The Secret Between Us

By Barbara Delinsky Deborah Monroe and her daughter, Grace, are driving home from a party when their car hits a man running in the dartk. Grace was at the wheel, but Deborah sends her home before the police arrive, determined to shoulder the blame for the accident. Her decision then turns into a deception that takes on a life of its own and threatens the special bond between mother and daughter.

The Secret Between Us is an unforgettable story about making bad choices for the right reasons and the terrible consequeces of a lie gone wrong. Once again, Barbara Delinksy has delivered a riveting study of family and a superbly crafted novel, perfectly targeted to reading groups and fans of provocative fiction.

One of the things I'll remember from Deepa, Christina said, is how kids from a bad neighborhood in America want an ipod and kids in poverty from Africa want an education. It was neat to meet someone who studied with Moth-

health, poverty and disparity on literacy. Delegates also worked together in small groups to develop an action plan for breaking down the barriers to education throughout the world. The plans, highlighting tangible and realistic roles, were presented on the final day of the conference.

"I feel lucky to have met such amazing people such as Mary Jean Eisenhower who is the granddaughter of Dwight D. Eisenhower, Charles Hostler, the former U.S. Ambassador to Bahrain, Francis Bok, Beatrice Biira, Deepa Willingham and Steve Culbertson, the president and chief executive officer of Youth Service America," Christina said. "I will never forget all the friends I've made along the way. I miss them all, but I hope to be seeing them again next year in Washington, D.C.'
