National Influenza Vaccine Week runs from Dec. 8 through Dec. 12.

Influenza and pneumonia claims the lives of more than 1,500 Kansans every year and is the leading cause of vaccinepreventable death in the United most vulnerable to severe effects States. Each year, between 15 million and 60 million people in the U. S. are infected, about 200,000 are hospitalized and Health and Environment and influenza complications.
