"It was great to get a win against Hobrock 1. Brewster Monday night," Coach Beims said "They might not be the powerhouse of year's past, but they are a quality program, and they have a good team. Beating perennially good teams is the first step to joining their ranks."

Although the Indians came out on top at the end, the lead changed hands during the game with the Bulldogs having a 24-23 halftime advantage. The Indians outscored Brewster in the first and third quarters and Brewster led the scoring in the second and fourth quarters.

St. Francis had a 46-40 advantage after the third quarter and held on to win the game.

"I thought the key to the game would be rebounding,"Coach Beims said. "I thought if we could limit their scoring opportunities we would be in good shape. We did win the "battle of the boards," but not overwhelmingly. What ultimately won it for us was threepoint shooting and free throws.



#### **Championship game Rawlins County 86.** St. Francis 44

After a reasonably even first quarter, the Buffs turned on the heat and scored 20 points or more in each succeeding period.

Rawlins County won the championship with an 86-44 effort after leading 45-20 at halftime. They had four players score in double figures.

St. Francis was led by M. Raile with 17 points and Kinen with 11. Raile had three three-pointers, three field goals and was 2-of-2 from the line. Kinen had two three's, two other field goals and a free throw.

"We really beat ourselves in this game," Coach Beims said. "Turnovers absolutely killed us. Rawlins County is a transition team. They like to get out and run. One of the keys was to keep them from doing that, but when you turn the ball over, it makes for a prime opportunity to run.

"They capitalized on our mistakes, but instead of slowing down and regaining control, we just kept feeding them the ball. A wise man once said that when you find yourself in a hole the first thing you do is stop digging. Especially in the second quarter, not only did we not stop digging, we called in a backhoe.'

Sainty had a 40-percent fieldgoal shooting but shot less than 50 percent from the free-throw line, making 5-of-11.

M. Raile had three blocks, T. Raile had seven rebounds and also led in steals with three. The team had 18 turnovers to six steals.

"Rebounding is another aspect of the game that needs improvement," Coach Beims said."Anytime you give a team like Rawlins County three or four chances to score, they usually will. We have to toughen up defensively and limit opponents' opportunities to score.

"Offensively we did alright, but we need to be more patient and clean up our offense. Little things like setting and using screens properly, and cutting down on turnovers certainly tops the list of things that need work.
