"One might think that scoring only 26 points in a varsity game is a product of great defense or poor offense. To some extent each of those may be true, but when executing any offense, players have to understand the little things, like how and when to make a pass, how to get open off a screen, how to protect the ball from defenders, and how to score when the opportunity presents itself.

"Those skills are not learned only in practice.
