Shirley Amack, 72, St. Francis, was traveling north on K-27 and William Roth, 25, Denver, was going east on U.S. 36 when the two vehicles collided. Both Mrs. Amack and Mr. Roth were pronounced dead on the scene.

Two passengers in the 1994 GMC pickup truck, Steven Headley, 28, Sterling, Colo., and Thomas Yim, 30, of Aurora, Colo., were injured and taken to the Cheyenne County Hospital by emergency medical technicians. Later, they were taken by medical air flight to The Saint Francis Herald.

The accident was worked by the Kansas Highway Patrol and Cheyenne County Sheriff officers. None of those in the accident were wearing seat belts. Sheriff Craig VanAllen said the accident is still under investigation.

Horse welcomes travelers

Francis are greeted by a unique Christmas decoration. The horse and sleigh, outlined with white lights, appears to be moving.

The horse and sleigh belongs to Eddy and Sherry Schultz, who live about 2miles east of St. Francis. Eddy says people often comment on the Christmas decoration, asking when they are going to put it up.

Eddy and his dad, Ed, made it about 17 years ago. Ed had made a Santa and sleigh to put on his roof and he thought Eddy and Sherry also needed something. They discussed it and they came up with the horse and sleigh.

Ed was a man for perfection so he measured the Schultz's horse, then took those figures back to his shop in town and drew out the horse on the floor with chalk. Eddy then bent the metal and formed the horse. He said some of the metal needed to be heated with a blow torch but they got the job done. The sleigh was much easier.

The lights for the horse were running lights to give the illusion of a trotting horse. The rest were regular Christmas lights. The first lights were attached with wire rings but, as the lights needed replaced, they used tape.

The Schultz's said they enjoy the horse and sleigh as much as those passing by. It has become a Christmas tradition.
