### Healthy program offered

Both Craig Van Allen, sheriff, and Dave Flemming, county road and bridge supervisor, asked that the commissioners consider implementing a "wellness plan" for employees. The county hospital has such a plan which its employees participate and offer it for county employees. The road and bridge department employees were enrolled in a plan several years ago but hadn't followed through.

The plan is determined by the person's weight, body fat, results from the tread mill and other tests. It also encourages those enrolled to get blood checks at health fairs.

The county insurance pays for these preventive measures for employees and their spouses. The department heads felt like it would be good for employees and encourage them to stay physically fit.

Mrs. Gilliland said she would follow up by contacting Mila Bandel, county health nurse. She said Mrs. Bandel will be able to answer any questions and head the employees in the right direction. Mrs. Gilliland will bring back information to the next meeting.
