Sophomore Jodie Hilt paced the team with 13 points while Elizabeth Gienger led in rebounds with nine and steals with 10.


We finally got a hard-earned victory, as this was a see-saw game for four quarters," Coach Larry Flemming said.

St. Francis senior Ethan Zweygardt, a four year member of the Indian football team, has been invited to participate in the Kansas Shrine Bowl as a member of the West team.


Zweygardt, who played both offense and defense, was a mainstay on the Indian line as an offensive guard and a defensive lineman.
