## **Indians lose two home contests**

St. Francis came soooo close to sending the game into overtime in the last seconds. The shot just did not go through the hoop. The team had displayed a surge in the final minutes of play and they succeeded in closing the gap but just not getting the win. The final score was 55-52.




