Most positions filled for April 7 election

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The deadline for filing for seats on Bird City or St. Francis city councils, the Bird City mayor and Cheylin or St. Francis school boards was noon on Tuesday.

Terry Miller, county election officer, reported filings were still

coming in Tuesday morning.

To run for a seat on the city council, the candidate must live within the city limits.

Sunflower Extension

Incumbent Cindy Burr and Tammy Grice filed for a seat on the Sunflower Extension Board. Two seats were up for election.

Ms. Grice will fill the seat left by Penny Gienger.

City council/mayor

There were a number of positions open in both cities on both the school and city boards. In both cities, the council can have any number of candidates running but only the seats which

are up for election will be filled by the candidates with the most votes in the April 7 election.

St. Francis — There are three city council seats up for election.

Those St. Francis members whose terms are up are: Rodney Bracelin, Natalie Knodel

and Carla Lampe. Filing by the deadline were Mrs. Lampe, Paula Keller, Justin Gardner Dan Hoard, Bruce Swihart, Jennifer Dankenbring-Padgett and Mike Hanson.

Bird City — There are two seats on the city council plus the position of mayor up for election. The

council positions are currently being served by Deb Smith and Wade Carmichael. Troy Burr is the mayor of Bird City.

Filing on Tuesday were Wade Carmichael for council. Troy Burr filed for mayor. That leaves one seat on the council to be filled by **See FILLED on Page 8A**

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A new topic came up at the St. Francis City Council meeting Tuesday night. Harold Tygart, St. Francis, spoke to the council regarding the wild cats that are multiplying in city. They move into old buildings and garages — any place where they can live. It was said that there are people in town who feel sorry for these cats and have been feeding them.

Mr. Tygart states these cats are easy to tell from household cats as their hair is usually matted, have watery eyes and act wild. They also carry many diseases which can harm humans as well as pets.

The ordinance reads there can be three cats or three dogs at a

residence, more than that and a kennel license is required.

The community needs to work together on this problem as tension is building on both sides of the issue. Right now there are a couple of traps being set by Mr. Tygart and then he is disposing of the wild cats.

Some of the issues arising are; do we need an animal control officer? where would the animals be kept for the required days after capture? There will be several ordinances looked into to help solve some of these questions.
