hospital's department heads reports on activities in their department. At the January meeting, Tenille Lee, director of nursing, the speaker.

Mrs. Lee has been the

director for three years and has worked at the hospital for seven years. She said her nursing staff is at an appropriate level and when more nurses are needed, there is a "calling tree" that is activated to call in more staff.

Cardiac monitors have been installed and the nursing staff is fully staffed. Mrs. Lee said likes them. She said the company provided training to all the staff, both day and night shifts. Traci Neitzel asked if nursing right now, she is doing fine and they are not using any agency nurses. Ward clerks are also certified nurses aides and they can be used in both areas. Candi Douthit is a nursing employee that is the obstetrics manager also works two shifts on the floor each week.

There are three staff members in licensed practical nursing school and they are planning on continuing on to registered nursing school. Nurses are also certified in Advanced Cardiac Life Support, Advanced Burn Life Support, Neo-natal resuscitation, Pediatric Advanced Life Support, Emergency Nurse Pediatric Course, Stabilizing Infant and preparing for transport and Trauma Nursing Core Course.

Jackie John, area director for Great Plains Health Alliance, said Mrs. Lee has been serving on the Core Team Committee for nursing documentation. She asked if Spanish-speaking patients and translations is becoming a problem. Mrs. Lee said there have been several Spanish-speaking patients and they have a commercial service that can be used to help translate. Irma Reed is on the staff and she can also help translate.

Jerry Toler, board member, asked if the nurses felt safe at night and if there were any security concerns?

Mrs. Lee said that the nurses don't like not being able to see the front door or ambulance entrance until they are right there. Les Lacy, hospital administrator, said he gave the sheriff and deputies a tour and showed them all the entrances and exits in the facility so they were aware of them.

Commissioners agree to pay their share of cost

karen.k@nwkansas.com Judges, county attorneys and clerk of the district court had a bid for a recording system for the courtroom in the courthouse. After the presentation, the Cheyenne County Commissioners, at the Friday meeting, agreed to pay for their share of

Judges Scott Showalter and Robert Van Allen, attorneys Mike Day, Kevin Berens and Kari Gilliland and Sharon Elliott, district court clerk, were present. Judge Showalter suggested getting only two bids for the

The FTR program is in use in Thomas County and costs \$6,400 plus the county would be required to get a computer (probably when totaled, the cost would be around

The second program, Smith Audio Visual, would cost around \$7,500 and they would need to purchase only the computer monitor.

Mr. Showalter said the Smith program is being purchased in Sherman County. If Cheyenne and Sherman counties purchased this system, it would cost \$1,000 less and the company would send trainers the third week in March. They would train in both counties at that time.

Mrs. Gilliland, county attorney, said through the diversion fund, she would donate \$2,800; the local Bar Association agreed to give \$1,000 and Cheyenne County would pay for the remainder, approximately \$2,750, out of the general capital

Contracts for fairgrounds

Mrs. Gilliland had drawn up simple resolutions concerning the sale of liquor on the fairgrounds. The resolution stated that the person renting the exhibit building must have the permit to sell before the building will be rented. The fair board would also need to let the commissioners know what was going on.

The other resolution dealt with renting the facility when liquor was not involved.

The resolutions will be reviewed by the fair board.

Dale Patton, commissioner, expressed concern about accountabilCounty attorney's office

Mrs. Gilliland talked about some remodeling that needs to be done in the county attorney's office located in the basement of the courthouse. Terry Miller, clerk, said he had checked some lighting problems in the office and said some rewiring needed to be done and some new light fixtures replaced.

She said that the copier in the office needs to be replaced. She will be checking with two businesses, looking for what is needed. She said it is important to have professional looking copies and, that a lot of copies are made in the office.

The commissioners agreed that she should have the copier. It was also noted that, because it will be able to make colored copies, other courthouse offices might be able to use it. Mr. Miller said he would be willing to pay for a portion of the costs out of his budget for the use of making colored copies.

Mrs. Gilliland said she had talked to Craig Schoenrogge about a problem he has with county roads being either opened or closed and obstructions in the roads. She will be studying the matter and hoped to get it resolved.

Development Corporation report

Chuck and Diane Kribs, Cheyenne County Development Corporation coordinators, had sent a thank you note in appreciation for the county's support for the appropriations \$10,100

Mr. Miller said Mr. Kribs had been in his office and it appears they are doing a good job. Mr. Kribs said they have two businesses that are considering locating in the county.

Emergency medical service report

Jannelle Bowers, emergency medical service director, was unable to attend because of weather conditions. She had told Mr. Miller that the five emergency medical technicians who had taken a class had passed. She also said there were \$2,650 in insurance write-offs last month.

Century II director's questions

Cathy Domsch, director for Bird City Century II, also could not make the meeting due to weather conditions, but the commissioners talked to her via a phone conference. She

said there were plans to have the old Bird City lumberyard demolished. She was hoping to get a discount on fees or even have fees waived at the landfill. The commissioners asked if the building could be used as a county fire department exercise. Mrs. Domsch said she would check with fire departments. If this isn't feasible, the commissioners said they'd reconsider waiving fees at

the landfill. Mrs. Domsch asked if the county had any control over burning within the city of Bird City and if concrete could be taken from the site and used on private farm ground. As far as burning within a city, they agreed this would be a city decision. They agreed that concrete could be placed in a private pasture, as long as the disposal site was obtained legally.

Road and bridge department report

Road and bridge supervisor, Dave Flemming, presented his bills paid to date. He said he had hired Gilbert Carroll to work part time and he hired Calvin Semler to work full time. He presented three bids for the trench at the landfill but was waiting for one more bid. The Board agreed to allow him to take the lowest responsible bid and then move forward with the engineering process.

In other business:

• The commissioners signed a letter of support for Colby Community College to start a wind technology • Mr. Miller was given permission

to purchase the new terminal and monitor for the AS400 networking. The cost is \$678. • The commissioners agreed that

• The audit contract with Anderson and Eldridge for \$12,900 plus mileage was signed. Mr. Eldridge will also help prepare the budget and the commissioners noted that he is always willing to help when


