Personal Property Assessments

These must be completed by March 16, 2009 without penalty. This deadline applies to all persons who render or list personal property. Assessments must be personally signed.

Taxable Items Include:

Pickups and trucks with 16 M or larger tags; boats; boat motors and trailers; golf carts, snowmobiles, jet skies and skidos; mopeds; campers and camping trailers that are not self-contained; mobile homes on rented or leased land; business equipment and fixtures.

Real estate improvements or structural changes to buildings should be reported to the County Appraiser's Office.
