More technicians are needed in **Cheyenne County**

Emergency medical technicians especially in the Bird City area.

Jannelle Bowers, Cheyenne County Emergency Medical Service director, reported at the Friday county commissioners' meeting that there might be a slightly longer dispatch time for both Bird City and St. Francis ambulance calls.

"We are approaching the time of year that the majority of the technicians in Bird City and St. Francis are usually out on agriculturalrelated jobs that do not allow them to respond in a timely manner," she said.

The Kansas State Board of Emergency Medical Services dictates a minimum requirement of technicians on a call calendar. At lest two emergency medical service personnel, specifically at least one first responder or higher and one emergency medical technician-B or higher must be available in order for an ambulance to proceed to the scene.

"We are asking the citizens of our county for their help in understanding this matter due to the posfrom another town," Mrs. Bowers said. "There might be a delay in also write her at P.O. Box 453, St. transportation.'

Typically, one or more technicians will respond to the scene to ditional, dedicated volunteers to provide patient care prior to the arrival of the ambulance.

"Cheyenne County Emergency are needed in Chevenne County, Medical Service is providing patient care to the best of our ability," Mrs. Bowers said.

> The service personnel is asking for understanding and cooperation from local employers. The state prohibits employers from discharging any employee by reason of the fact that the employee performs duties as a volunteer fire fighter, volunteer certified emergency medical services attendant, as defined in KSA 65-6112. Also amended are volunteer reserve law enforcement officers or parttime law enforcement officers.

We are deeply grateful to all employers who not only allow their employees to leave work to provide emergency patient services but also encourage their service to the community," Mrs. Bowers said.

For years, there has been youth ball including T-ball, pitching machine up to the older baseball and softball teams. However, Jolene Dodd, St. Francis Recreation coordinator, said there are fewer number of participants playing summer ball.

At 7 p.m. on Thursday, March 26, there will be a meeting in the high school cafeteria. Parents and other interested people are asked to attend. Their input will help determine if there is enough interest in the summer ball program to continue planning.

"We really hate to lose the program and, if there is enough interest out there, we will keep it going," Mrs. Dodd said.

Each year, the rec program receives 1 mill or approximately \$40,000. The majority of the money is spent for summer ball programs, even though there is a small entry fee for C-teams and older. However, there is no fee for kids to participate in T-ball and pitching machine. The program also furnishes uniforms.

The money is also used for flag football, sponsoring basketball programs throughout the year, volleyball camps, PeeWee Wrestling and for swim team and lifeguards.
